Style Guide for George Sand Studies

General Recommendations:

- 1. Use the MLA Handbook, 6th edition, 2003.
- 2. Use Word and send as an attachment to an email to Françoise Massardier-Kenney and/or Isabelle Naginski.
- 3. Font: Times New Roman, 12 points.
- 4. Endnotes appear after the text, before the list of works cited; endnote numbers appear in superscript, with Arabic numerals, after all punctuation marks.
- 5. For a new paragraph, use the tab bar, not the space bar; indentation for paragraphs should be ½ inch
- 6. Do not use hyphenation option so as to facilitate the composition.
- 7. Numbers above fifteen should be spelled out except for:
 - a. dates
 - b. time
 - c. centuries (use Arabic numerals and superscript 'th', etc.)
 - d. statistics
- 8. Titles should be short; subtitles and titles should use capitals and lower-case letters, not all caps; there is no period or stop at the end of a title

Quotations (MLA style)

- 1. Use this style double quotation marks: " ", and never italics.
- 2. Use this style single quotations marks: ' ' for quotations within double quotation marks.
- 3. If the quotation goes over 4 lines of text, it should be separated from the body of the text, indented on the left the same as a paragraph indentation. This should be a single-spaced block.
- 4. Any elisions should be indicated by three periods with a space before and after and in between.
- 5. Any changes in a quotation should be indicated between square brackets.
- 6. Quotations in foreign languages can have the translation in parentheses or if long, in an endnote.

Abbreviations

Abbreviations should be limited to footnotes and bibliographical references if possible.

- 1. Act 1, scene iv: I.iv.
- 2. Chapter 1: ch. 1
- 3. Manuscript: ms.; mss. in the plural
- 4. Editor: ed.; eds. in the plural
- 5. In collaboration with: *et al*.
- 6. Paragraph: § (followed by Arabic numeral)
- 7. Directed by: dir.
- 8. Without date or place: n.d.; n.p.
- 9. Volume: vol.; vols. in plural
- 10. Lines of poetry: l.; ll. in plural

Endnotes

1. When possible, use parenthetical references, as specified by the MLA Handbook. The information must match the corresponding information in the works cited. If the author's name is in the text, you need only indicate the pages: "Naginski argues this point pertinently (289)." If the author's name isn't in that sentence, add it to the parenthetical reference: "This point has been made elsewhere (Naginski 289)." If there are several items by the same author in your works cited, use an abbreviated title: "As has been noted, musical references often serve to advance the plot (Powell, Music 127)."

- 2. For multiple references to a primary text, the first reference, say to *Consuelo*, would have a full endnote, including the sentence: "Subsequent references to this edition will be indicated parenthetically in the text with the abbreviation *C*." In subsequent references, then, this would appear as *C* 245, i.e., abbreviation, space, and Arabic numerals for pages; or in the case of a multivolume work, *C* I: 345, where you should use the abbreviation, a space, a Roman numeral to indicate the volume, a colon followed by a space, and finally the page(s).
- 3. Book: Name, Surname, *Title* (place: publisher, date), pages.

- 4. Article: First-Name Surname, "Title," Journal 25.3-4 (2001): 34-35.
- 5. For further examples, consult MLA Handbook, Ch. 6, and appendix B.1.

Works Cited

- 1. In all cases, use 'Works Cited' and not a more general 'Bibliography'.
- 2. Order alphabetically by authors' last names. Capitalize only the first letter of the last name.
- 3. Book: Surname, First-Name. Title. Place: Publisher, year.
- 4. Article: Surname, First-Name. "Title." Journal 42.2 (1999): 3-18.
- 5. Foreword: Surname, First-Name. Foreword. *Title*. By author of edited work. Place: Publisher, date. xv-xxi.
 - a. Drabble, Margaret. Introduction. *Middlemarch*. By George Eliot. New York: Bantam, 1985. vii-xvii.
- 6. Dissertation: Surname, Name. "Title." Diss. New York U, 1999.
